Community Skating Rink

So far this winter has had lots of cold snowy weather. The conditions have been great for the community skating rink. In case you do not know where the rink is located, it is in the park on the north side of the community building.

New Community Garden

There has been an active and passionate group of community residents working on getting approval for a new community garden. The application to the City has been submitted and the hope is it will be built in time for the next growing season. It will be located just to the north and west of the community building. The open style of this new community garden will be different than the one located in Aberhart Park on 24th Avenue SW which has a fence around it. The names of the two gardens will be the Mission Community Garden (the current one) and the Cliff Bungalow Community Garden (the new one). The Mission Community Garden has had a waiting list ever since it opened so

the new one will help meet the community gardening needs in our community. As far as I know, we will be the only community with two community gardens.

New Carpet in the Community Hall

On December 19, new carpet was installed in the community hall. Due to the increased use of our hall during the last year which increased exponentially during the flood recovery period, the old carpet was on its last legs. The new carpet looks great as you will see when you attend one of the functions in the hall. Thank you to Jan Pugh for spearheading this project.

Lots of Activities at the Community Centre

We have several monthly events in the community hall that cater to a wide variety of interests. We have a Jazz concert usually on the first Wednesday of the month. This is a great way of meeting other community residents and share some great food. We have a movie night usually on the last Sunday. The movies are thought provoking documentaries. 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
Sale of Park Land on the Cliff Bungalow Escarpment

The Cliff Bungalow-Mission Community Association and the Mount Royal Community Association are addressing a sub-division application regarding the sale of public parkland into private ownership. The area being addressed is Hillcrest Avenue on the Cliff Street escarpment. A petition addressed to Mayor Nenshi and Council will be distributed.

The area in question is known as Hillcrest Viewpoint or Evamy Park, a spectacular location offering one of the best views of the downtown skyline and the location of many historic photographs of our city from the 1880's and onward. Prior to the submission of the application to the Land and Asset Strategy Committee of the City of Calgary, a meeting with Councilor Wooley, the Cliff Bungalow-Mission Community Association and the Mount Royal Community Association will take place (January 2014). Details may be found on our website at cliffbungalowmission.com under the 'sale of public parkland' header.

The boards of Cliff Bungalow-Mission Community Association and Mount Royal Community Association oppose the sale of public parkland, especially inner city green space which is scarce and unlikely to be restored or replaced. The land was deeded to the City of Calgary by the CPR in 1920 to be used solely for park and community service.

Our community is underserved in terms of parkland as it is and we cannot afford to miss the opportunity of using this space to serve both our communities. It provides view areas, pathway links between communities, and offers a key element of an overall social and environmental plan for the Cliff Bungalow Escarpment.





February Is Heart Month

Alberta Health Services

Do you know the signs and symptoms of a heart attack and what to do if someone experiences these? Knowing can make the difference between life and death. Recognizing and responding immediately to the warning signs of a potential heart attack can significantly improve survival and recovery. **February is Heart Month** - take the time to be heart safe and learn how you can reduce your risk.

What to do when seconds count

- Call 9-1-1 immediately. Early treatment can greatly reduce heart damage and make the difference of life and death.
- Treatment starts the moment EMS arrives. Paramedics can provide oxygen, start an intravenous and perform an electrocardiogram (ECG).
- Paramedics can also administer important medications in the early minutes of a heart attack to lessen heart damage.
- During transport, EMS will also share information with the hospital so definitive treatment can begin immediately on arrival.
- Take a CPR/AED (automated external defibrillator) course. Training is widely available from many reputable organizations. It's easy, inexpensive, and only takes a few hours.

Know the signs of a heart attack

(Any or all of these signs and symptoms may occur)

- Chest pain described as crushing, squeezing, pressure or chest heaviness
- Pain that moves beyond the chest such as shoulder, arm, neck or jaw pain
- Shortness of breath, sweating or nausea and vomiting

Reduce your risk

Heart attack risk factors include:

- Obesity
- Sedentary lifestyle
- Smoking
- High cholesterol
- Age / Gender
- Family history

Speak with your doctor about how to treat your modifiable risk factors and learn to be heart safe.

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



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

Elbow River Pedestrian Bridges Replacement Project

Update December 2013

Work is proceeding on the Elbow River Pedestrian Bridges Replacement project. The City of Calgary has hired an international engineering firm, Delcan with an office in Calgary, to create a design to replace the bridges damaged in the June 2013 flood. In addition to a portfolio of work done in Canada and around the globe, Delcan has also worked for The City on the Arbourstone/Stoney pedestrian bridge completed in 2010 and on the Heritage pedestrian overpass, which is currently underway.

The design consultant will develop two to three concept designs, which will be evaluated by the project team. The team will select one concept, which the public will be able to view in early 2014 (more information will be provided then). A construction contractor will be hired in early 2014 with the intention to start construction in the spring of 2014.
