PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Annual General Meeting

Our Annual General Meeting was held on November 28th. When I write this column, it is almost a month before the actual publication so I cannot report on who is on the Board. This will be reported in the January issue of the newsletter.

I can report that we had candidates for every key position including Treasurer. I can also note that some people on the Board prior to the AGM were willing to take on a new role on the Board. So check out the next issue of the newsletter and find out who is who on the new Board.

New Membership Card

Effective with the AGM, we have a new type of membership card. They are plastic and are renewable from year to year. We will issue updated expiry dates each year you renew. The cost has increased but will be comparable to other inner city community associations. The cost for a single person is \$10 per year and for families will be \$20. We will be approaching businesses in the community to honour these new cards for discounts. Any business who wishes to participate, just contact us. We will list those businesses and the discounts they are offering in our newsletter on a monthly basis.

Continuing Flood Impacts

We are still experiencing impacts from the flood of 2013. Many people who live near the Elbow River are still not back into their homes. Several businesses on 4th Street are also not open for business although a lot of activity is occurring at those sites. We sincerely hope they will be home and open for business very soon.

There have been various forums during recent months. I attended one in September that was really informative. The Glenmore Dam was built in 1932 for water supply to the City. It has limited capacity for water storage although they are investigating if and how it could be increased. The peak inflow at the dam on

June 20 was 1240 m3/sec which s a 1:500 year rate. The peak outflow at the dam on June 21 was 700 m3/sec which is a 1:100 year rate. The latter in 2005 was 300 m3/sec which is a 1:20 year rate. The City set up an expert panel to help identify ways and means of reducing the impact of future flood events. This and other studies being undertaken are timed for July 2014. Unfortunately this could be after the potential flood period next year. I am sure all of us will be following these and other studies with keen interest. We need to learn how to better predict and control potential future floods in urban areas.



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
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Century Home

Inglis/McNeil Block (1910) - Mission Cycle — Vin Room



This intriguing Century Home has lived and continues to live many lives. It's a great example of the mixed commercial/residential historic character of 4th Street or Broadway, its original name. It began life as a Queen Anne Revival style home, complete with charming hipped roof and cross-gables. The first resident was Mrs. Inglis followed by Annie and Malcolm McNeil, a Dominion Government Fruit Inspector. During the 1930's it was home to contractor John Heslip, and later to John Keegan, a woodworker at Hay & Harding.

The "White Line" streetcar line was introduced along 4th Street in 1909 and was gradually extended over the following decades to become a very important streetcar

route. Quite naturally, a commercial corridor evolved along 4th Street. This Century Home was part of that evolution. Around 1955 it was converted to a business with the addition of an inviting mid-century, commercial-Modern style storefront. The building also gained an impressive freestanding Mission Cycle neon sign which is a landmark in Calgary and a rare remaining neon sign in the city.

The building is on the Calgary Heritage Authority inventory of historic resources. From the City of Calgary website, Mission Cycle:

"was established by Henry Cappy Cheal in 1927 as a bicycle repair and skate-sharpening shop. Originally located in the former Blue Rock Hotel on 4th Street & 25th Avenue SW, it relocated to 2414 4th St SW before moving to 2310 4th Street in 1955. The shop passed from Henry Cheal to his son Bill, then to Bill's daughter Diane Fox. Ryan Fox, Bill Cheal's grandson, also worked in the business. The store served Calgarians for 79 years, making it the oldest bicycle shop in Calgary before it closed in November 2003."


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Hanging a stocking on the fireplace mantel on Christmas Eve is a tradition that began in Germany, and has been adopted by many people in Canada and the U.S.A.

Traditional practice was to reserve the stocking for five gifts that stimulate each of the five senses:

- something to eat, like fruit or candy
- a toy or other item that makes a noise (including nuts to crack)
- · a visually pleasing item like jewellery, cuff-links, a colouring book
- something tactile, like modelling clay, a soft toy, or a pair of socks
- a fragrant item such as bubble bath, cologne, scented candles, etc.

Originally, children used one of their everyday socks, but eventually, special Christmas stockings were created for this purpose.

Many families create their own personalized Christmas stockings, with each family member's name stitched into the stocking. Creativity abounds – some are hand-knit, crocheted, quilted, or appliquéd, large and small!

- 2. Link your property assessment to your myID account. When you receive your 2014 Assessment Notice in January, go to calgary.ca/assessmentsearch and sign into Secure Login with your myID UserID and Password. Enter the Roll Number and Access Code displayed on your Notice.



DEVELOPMENT WATCH

It has been a very strange fall season in the neighbourhood; parts of our community are exhibiting a renewed vitality and accessibility while others are eerily quiet. As a short stroll through Mission east of the Holy Cross will show we are still very much in the throes of flood recovery and rebuilding. As of this writing, almost all ground floor and basement multi-family units in this are not inhabited and some are not even being worked on, and the Holy Cross itself is not yet open. A number of businesses on 4th Street are still not operating, including the Shopper's, Wurst, the Joyce, Earl's and Bin 905 among others. Unfortunately some others were not able to weather the economics of this disaster. We wish all residents, associations and business owner's the best in their efforts to rebuild through the winter and look forward to the renewed vitality of these areas upon completion.

On a positive note, we have seen the return of our streets and sidewalks along the High Street with the near completion of the Maxwell Bates building on 22nd and the Strategic office building. We can finally walk uninterrupted from 17th Avenue to Mission Bridge without doing the construction shuffle. This walkability relief may be short lived in residential areas however, as numerous development permits have reached approval stage. We expect construction to start soon on the District condo project at 18th and 2nd, Tela on 22 Avenue between 2nd and 4th and the old Painted La-

dies site on 23rd and 5th. As we have become only too aware of over the past years, the major issues with any new construction site are respect of neighbours and the streetscape in terms of good construction practises, and preservation and protection of the existing urban canopy (street trees). If you become aware of anything you consider inappropriate do not hesitate to call Bylaw or the Parking Authority through the City 311 number.

The Planning and Development Committee of CBM-CA will be experiencing a period of transition over the next year, with responsibilities, policy and framework changing to adapt to the rapid change occurring in our community and our city. The challenges of intensification of established communities, quality urban design, and housing diversity and affordability, brought about in part by the implementation phase of the Municipal Development Plan, require a comprehensive policy and strategy to maintain the integral character and quality of our neighbourhoods. We must continue to build a great community by recognizing our sense of place and building upon existing diversity, neighbourhood character, heritage and cultural identity. There will be more news of this in the coming weeks and months.

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The Christmas season is prime time for car prowlers and thieves. Gifts and valuables in vehicles can make their jobs easy. Here are a few tips to help reduce your risk:

- When you exit or enter your parked vehicle, stop and take a look around the area.
- Before leaving your parked car, always remove the keys, roll up the windows and lock the doors.
- Park in a well-lit area, use parking lots frequented by others
- Put all valuables and gifts in your trunk. If that's not possible, conceal gifts and other valuables.
- Try not to unload gifts in your vehicle and then leave it unattended in the same parking spot. Car prowlers might be on the lookout for shoppers traveling back and forth from stores to unload gifts.
- Never leave your car running unattended.
- If you park in an attached garage, always lock the door leading from the house to the garage and the garage door.
- If you don't park in a secure garage at home, don't leave gifts in cars overnight to keep them secret.
- After opening an automatic gate to underground parking, wait for the gate to close before you park.

Prevent crime by reporting suspicious behaviour to police at 403 266-1234. Call 911 for a crime in progress.

If your car is broken into:

- Inventory missing articles for later use with the police or an insurance claim.
- Report online at www.calgarypolice.ca/onlinreporting or in person at a district office. Even if there's little chance of catching the suspect, alerting the police can help prevent somebody else's car from being prowled.

ELBOW RIVER PEDESTRIAN BRIDGES REPLACEMENT UPDATE

Three pedestrian bridges along the Elbow River were damaged beyond repair in the June 2013 flood. The City of Calgary is beginning the process to replace these bridges.

Over 100 people attended an information session held on Sept. 17. The project team was on hand to answer questions and explain the process that The City will use to replace the pedestrian bridges. If you were unable to attend this session, please visit www.calgary.ca/elbowbridges to view the presentation boards and the Question and Answer document from this session.

Over 1,400 people responded to an online survey on bridge use. The survey is now closed, but we will post a synopsis of survey results after Nov. 4 at www. calgary.ca/elbowbridges. Please also visit the web page to sign up to receive future email updates on the project.

You may see some activity around the bridges themselves. A number of different activities, such as geotechnical investigations and land surveys, are being undertaken as a preliminary step in the project to replace the bridges.

The web page will be the primary source for up-todate project information at www.calgary.ca/elbowbridges. We will also communicate through community newsletters and through delivery of updates in the community via Canada Post. MOVIE

The Greenest Building

"The greenest building is the one that isn't torn down and hauled to the land-fill." - Carl Elefante, architect

Despite our current focus on reducing, reusing, and recycling, we continue to demolish buildings at an astonishing rate, with construction waste now constituting 25-33% of our land fill. *The Greenest Building*, the film we aired October 27th, looks beyond new energy-efficient buildings to solutions of upgrading and re-using older buildings. This delivers a "triple bottom-line" of environmental, economic

and social sustainability. Environmentally, upgrading existing buildings uses fewer natural resources and also saves the *embodied energy* used to create the building and its materialsm, often adding up to decades of energy consumption. Economically, rehabilitation projects comprise about 70 % labour and 30% materials, versus new construction which is roughly 50-50%. Not only are more jobs created, but these jobs are local. And looking forward, older buildings are often small-business friendly which means more local jobs on an ongoing basis. Socially, updating older buildings is often lower cost, so the result can be more affordable housing. Add to that the quality of life and cultural benefits that heritage and character buildings deliver.

After the film two presenters generously shared their time to share Calgary successes. Doug Cassidy from Canada Lands presented the Currie Barracks LEED-ND project certified at the Gold level. This neighbourhood contains the highest concentration of provincially designated historic military buildings and landscapes in urban Alberta. The project integrates heritage places like the Officers' Mess and Parade Square with new residential and commercial development built to LEED standards. Mark Chambers presented the Calgary Public Building 2008-11 LEED restoration, also Gold certified (Platinum applied for and pending). The project took advantage of the passive energy efficiency in the building's original design; for example its U-shaped plan with courtyard and its large skylights and windows significantly reduced the energy required for artificial lighting. The team went to great lengths to preserve beautiful original features and materials, yet the overall budget was a fraction of the cost to construct a new building with the same capacity.

The real highlight of the evening was the audience who braved Calgary's first winter storm of the season to see the film, and to engage with the speakers and each other. Although there was not time to focus on heritage houses, the same principles apply and there's an excellent how-to book by Aaron Lubeck called *Green Restorations* (copies available at the library). Birds are now easier to see as the trees have shed their leaves, there are fewer species present and they often occur in large flocks.

Allow them to enrich their life enjoying the great outdoors during morning or afternoon weekend sessions. The fee for youth 16 years of age and under is only \$5.00 with one registered adult.

As a fundraiser for the Friends of Fish Creek, these outings will be conducted by lifelong birder and naturalist, Gus Yaki, and other experienced birding instructors.





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
