Pandemic 2020: What Legacy Will It Leave? by Ted Knudtson

It is the beginning of April as I write this. The initial shock of the pandemic and resulting social isolation has passed, and people are grimly coming to terms with this new reality and grappling with the uncertainty it brings. How long will this last? When will we be back to work? When will things get back to normal? *Will* things get back to normal?

I wish I could say we will all get through this, but sadly this just isn't the case. As this cruel virus preys upon our elders, our sick, and our most vulnerable populations, it will leave many who will not live to see the end of this crisis. There will be businesses that close, never to reopen. There will be industries that struggle to recover. There will be a loss of innocence as we are reminded how fragile life can be, and emotional trauma that will linger long after the pandemic is under control.

Furthermore, this pandemic has brought into sharp relief the inequities extant in our society. COVID-19 is

not some great equalizer, as some have suggested. The effects of the pandemic are profoundly gendered (domestic violence has skyrocketed), classist (as evidenced by the deepening poverty and desperation of the poor and working class unable to work from home or distance in suburban homes), and racist (as seen in the disproportionate death rates of black people in the United States and in the dehumanizing treatment of refugees and immigrants throughout the world).

Amidst all of the doom and gloom, however, there could be positive change, as well.

People will have a renewed belief in the need for, and power of, connection with friends, family, and community, for it will be these things that get us through these dark days. Parents are eating breakfast regularly with their kids for the first time many can remember. People are leveraging video conferencing tools to re-engage with far-flung family, having game nights and gatherings from across continents. Community members are reaching out to their neighbours and volunteering with

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community associations, finding renewed hope in the connection these actions bring.

There will be less focus on material wealth, possessions, and status, for surely we have all seen how little those things sustain us through troubled times. As this crisis fell upon us, many sought a sense of control by spending what they could on food and supplies, only to realize a mountain of toilet paper could not make them feel safe. Instead, as our ability to consume was removed, it was our ability to learn, to experience, to sing, to dance, to love, and to laugh that gave us hope.

For many, the current crisis will encourage reflection on the negative impact human activities have on nature and the planet. As industries grind to a halt, might we see rivers running clean and skies clearing of pollution for the first time any can remember? If so, people will hunger for more, and really believe change is possible. No, the dolphins have not returned to the canals of Venice... but maybe they could!

Never again will anyone be able to dispute the need for a robust, publicly-funded healthcare system. This pandemic has proven all of us are vulnerable and need reliable, accessible healthcare. COVID-19 affects both rich and poor, and it is plain to see that dismantling or diluting the quality of healthcare we have access to will be done at peril to us all.

We will come to understand which professions truly deserve our admiration, support, and fair remuneration. We will truly value our healthcare workers, emergency service providers, and front-line staff in a lasting, meaningful way, and not just when we need them. We will come to know the true heroes in society are not pop stars and elite athletes, but grocery store clerks, social workers, truck drivers, utilities technicians, custodial staff, and every other worker who keep our society running, keep us fed, and keep us safe. And we will pay them accordingly.

This pandemic has shone a light on inequities in our society and made us aware of continuing injustices. Could this be the time we confront these inequities unflinchingly and address them? The truth is we do not all suffer equally, and it is those with more who need to rise to this occasion and play an active role in protecting those with less. As Gandhi said, "The true measure of any society can be found in how it treats its most vulnerable members."

We will realize that we are, all of us, interconnected and interdependent. We will understand that to serve others is to serve ourselves, and we will do so willingly, selfishly (because it feels good!), and joyfully. We will understand the value of a human life, and we will look upon others and know that there but for the grace of chance or God or fate or circumstance or the universe or dumb luck go l.

There will be many legacies to come of this unprecedented time, some we can imagine, some which are as yet unknowable. But there is one thing of which I am certain: We have the power, each one of us, to start writing these legacies now.

Will this be a time where we devolve into individualism, or will we come together? Will we learn the lessons this pandemic has to teach us, or will we return to our old habits the moment we are able? Will you look back on this time with pride, knowing you rose to the challenge and did all you could support and safeguard those around you? You have the power to decide, right here, right now.

Stay safe, be well, and know that no matter how challenging things may get, it's going to be okay.

bout the Backstory: Fleeing the 1975 Civil War, the Ghosn family abandoned Lebanon and escaped abroad. Returning seventeen years later, their nowadult son Sami discovered

squatters occupying the family Beqaa Valley estate. Immediately, he set about the extended task of reclaiming, then rehabilitating the family property; and executed on a vision to produce great wines at the fringes of winemaking geography.

About Collaboration: In 1998, after a chance encounter with prominent winemaking families the Hebrards of Bordeaux and the Bruniers of the Rhône Valley, the Ghosns partnered with both French dynasties. Assessing Lebanon's landscape; the trio strategized planting aspect, varietal selection, and vineyard management; planting select whites on the cooler mountainside slopes, with reds set in the valley below.

About Terroir: Situated at 1,700 metres in the chalky schist of Mt. Lebanon, the tiny (two-hectare) Faqra Vineyard sits amongst the highest elevations of any in the northern hemisphere. Here, long and gentle summers (average 25C) enable gradual grape development, prevailing breezes maintain vine health, cool evenings enhance grape character, and high-altitude snowfall supplies the required moisture.

About the Wine: A blend of equal parts Obeidi, Clairette, Rolle (Vermentino), Sauvignon Blanc, and Chardonnay; the light golden pour precedes aromas of nettle, honeysuckle and fresh star fruit. In the mouth, the glycerin palate features flavours of quince, papaya and ripe golden apple preceding the long and stony finish. **About Obeidi:** A native grape well suited to the hot Beqaa Valley, Obeidi is the only grape of the blend not grown on the mountain. Sourced from growers in the valley below, it provides texture and exotic fruit character to the Massaya Blanc blend. Obeidi is the traditional grape used in the making of the popular Lebanese spirit Arak.

About Pairing: Moussaka, fowl with apple/pecan dressing, white fish, creamy cheeses.

About Sustainability: Eschewing formal certification, the Ghosn/Hebrard/Brunier partnership produces all-natural wines. Grown without the use of synthetic agents, Massaya wines are fermented with indigenous yeasts and bottled without filtration.

Exploring Nature Together While Apart

Calgary River Valleys is a non-profit organization dedicated to building a strong and effective voice for river valley protection and water quality in Calgary. We consider ourselves to be "the voice of our rivers." While our group activities are temporarily suspended, Calgary River Valleys is continuing to plan for our upcoming riverbank restorations. In the meantime, Calgary River Valleys encourages you to get outside, at a safe social distance abiding by any updated provincial and federal guidelines, and enjoy our beautiful urban waterways.

From West Nose Creek in the north to Pine Creek in the south, Twelve Mile Coulee to the west and Forest Lawn Creek to the east, Calgary has an abundance of fresh water. Our rivers and streams are also a haven for wildlife who depend on these special areas for their habitats and food. Some of the animal species to be found within the City are beavers, muskrats, cougars, deer, raccoons, eagles, porcupine, bobcats and black bears. Northern flying squirrels and pine marten have also recently been observed.

In May, migrating birds that return to the North include warblers, kinglets, song sparrows, Franklin's gulls, and swallows. You may also observe spring indicator plant species like aspen poplar, pussy willows, and saskatoon bushes have bloomed in our river and creek valleys, and green has returned to our part of the world.

While you are out, don't forget to bring a camera along to capture what you see around you. While the City Nature Challenge is now over, Calgarians can contribute to the iNaturalist (https:// www.inaturalist.org/) community at any time to document our City's beauty and biodiversity. Every observation can contribute to biodiversity science, from the rarest butterfly to the most common backyard weed. iNaturalist shares your findings with scientific data repositories like the Global Biodiversity Information Facility (https://www.gbif.org/) to help scientists find and use your data. All you have to do is observe, take a picture, and upload it, noting the location of where you saw that species.

For the more artistically inclined, each year, beginning on May 1, the Friends of Fish Creek Provincial Park Society, offers their Capture Nature photo contest (https://friendsoffishcreek.org/ programs/capturenature/) as a fun and creative opportunity for park users to engage with their natural surroundings. The contest

is also part of the Friends' "Social Enterprise" programming, with all proceeds contributing to their ongoing stewardship and education programming in Fish Creek Provincial Park. All submissions must be images taken in Fish Creek Provincial Park.

There are 3 new contest themes this year that they hope will spark some creativity, encourage you to visit the park often and get you to think outside of the box! These 3 themes are: "A Bug's Eye View", "Power & Grace", and "Weather or Not."

Are you up for the challenge? There is a \$25 registration fee for adults, but the program is free for youth 17 years of age or under. Healthy Indoor Air

Ever consider who is responsible for the safety and health in your home?

- Food: Health Canada assures food safety
- Water: Your municipality purifies your water, unless you are on a well
- Shelter: Your municipality assures compliance to codes; utility providers look after gas & electricity
- Air: You are responsible for the air quality inside of your family's home

So, How Healthy is Your Home's Indoor Air?

Is it disinfected? Sterilized? Outside, Mother Nature constantly purifies the air we breathe. Rain, wind, and lightning purify outdoor air by removing particles and other impurities. Ultraviolet energy from the sun purifies air by removing germs, odours, gases and other contaminants. The result is clean, pure, healthy air. These processes are not present in our homes. In fact, in chasing energy efficiency, we sealed our homes and prevented Mother Nature from coming in.

Without proper ventilation and air cleaning systems, pollutants get trapped inside of our homes and circulate all day long. A typical central heating and cooling system like the one in your home recirculates over a million cubic feet of air each day, air which includes dust, germs and viruses that we breath over and over again. On a side note, did you know that disinfecting wipes actually require 10 minutes of dwell time to kill bugs as advertised? Also, according to the Centres for Disease Control and Prevention, hand washing mechanically removes pathogens, while laboratory data demonstrate that 60% ethanol and 70% isopropanol inactivates viruses that are genetically related to, and with similar physical properties as, the 2019-nCoV.

Back to air, how can you disinfect or sterilize the air that recirculates through your home? The solution is to treat the cause, not the symptoms, with a complete indoor air cleaning strategy controlling all kinds of airborne contaminants, creating cleaner, fresher and healthier indoor air environment.

Part of the solution relies on the continuous application of a botanical (ie. non smelly, harmless to your family) disinfectant to your heating and cooling system.
